WELCOME 1987!

Outgoing President Frank Cunningham wants to thank his board of directors and the entire membership for their support and worthwhile activities during 1986. Frank emphasizes to all of us how much our Spartanburg Men's Garden Club means to our community.

New President Walter Soderberg and his 1987 slate of officers have held two directors' meetings to get an early start on planning activities. He tells us that considerable more help is needed on project committees and he will welcome those volunteering to assist. An early upcoming project, plants for flower beds, will be headed by George Drummond this year.

NORTH PINE PROJECT

The most recent phase of the three year North Pine Street project was 95% completed this month when 173 red maple trees were planted on public and private property from I-85 to Main Street.

The trees are of an improved and patented variety of red maple called "Red Sunset", significant for its bright red fall foliage. (Where power lines encroach, a small version, "Trident", was used.) The project was directed by Henry Pittman with the help of Julian Foster, Frank Cunningham, and Jack Bracken.

The project was financed by funds received from our club, the Spartanburg Board of Tourism, and from private Pine Street property owners. We give special thanks to the following property owners:

TREE DISTRIBUTION RESULTS



BILLBOARD CONTROL ORDINANCE. A hearing before the County Planning Commission and County Council was held Tuesday, February 3. The January draft of the ordinance was discussed. There was general agreement that the ordinance was a good one with respect to size, location, spacing and maintenance of offsite billboards. A considerable number of our club members sided with those who want the grandfather clause removed and a time for existing sign amortization be included. This would be a good first ordinance step with fair provision for bringing existing billboards into compliance with the ordinance over a designated future time span.

A. U.S. Senate Bill 387 is a recommended federal billboard control measure. Telephone calls to Senators Thurmond 582-1120 and Hollings 585-3702 can help.

Charles Burdell stopped at The Shepherd's Center crafts session Friday a.m. to confide how great retirement is — it was one whole week. He is now taking the Master Gardener program at Spartan Tech. Congratulations and welcome. • Early garden helps being tried by some this year are Parks Miracle Mulch and Agryl P17. Both admit moisture, the mulch holds back weeds, the light weight P17 admits sun, conserves heat, dampens wind and floats on the growing plants. • Dave Stoltz has about 3300 treelets planted on his 25 acres off Chapel Road near Glendale (Black Walnut, Sycamore, Leland Cypress and Norway Spruce).

FAIRFOREST PARK

Tree Bank Plantings have expanded further in the past month as virtually all of the new treelets purchased for the 87-88 season have been received. Crape Myrtle cuttings prepared at the 820 Reidville Road nursery are being prepared for planting. 2400 White Crape Myrtle cuttings were bruised, dipped in root promoter and fungicide and planted on March 7.

Park Plantings (on the upper level by the playground) are progressing. Several full truck loads of old leaves were brought up from the valley and about 150 sizeable holes were dug by back hoe. An assortment of trees including some of the larger ones from the tree bank are being planted in the upper area of the park.

Harold Hatcher is leading in the above work and has been greatly helped by several civil workers.

For the *Irrigation System*, Jess Taylor has arranged for the Spartanburg Water System people to help with trenching of the line to the tree bank. The City Engineering people will install the line. The materials will be paid for by the club.

ROSE SHOW, 15th, 1987

At the director's March 5 meeting, Bob Reynolds agreed to handle this project for the club again this year. He would like a concerted effort be made, starting now, to encourage local residents to participate. As a start, will each of you members pass in notes at our regular meeting describing name and address of any friends you may know who grow roses. Neighborhood Beautification Projects: Red maples plantings along **North Pine St.**, about 185 trees, is about concluded. It is hoped auto dealers on the street may eventually become participants. These plantings have been made professionally at a total cost of about \$3,000. A tourism grant, matching funds from club treasury, and substantial donations from property owners have accomplished this project. Henry Pittman and his committee are congratulated. This committee will lead such spring pruning work that will benefit previous North Pine Street tree plantings.

US 29, West Main St. beyond Woodstock Road and East Main St. are targeted for tree plantings. A Tourism Grant, with matching funds from the club is being requested to initiate this program. Harold Hatcher (West) and John Nevison (East) are cooperating to get this program started.

Our directors have asked our Secretary, Dick Look, to send letters complimenting the two new businesses locating on opposite sides of East Main Street at Bell Hill for the attractive landscaping they are doing.

Fairforest Park & Tree Bank

Tree bank plantings are pretty much complete for the season. Crape Myrtle cuttings set out have reached over 5000 in number. A recent gift of 300 white dogwood and 250 loblolly pine treelets was gratefully accepted from Mr. David Nantz and added to the bank.

Maintenance work is continuing on a regular basis with help of civil servants. For example, on April 11, two members and five civil servants planted the last 500 crape myrtle cuttings, applied pre-emergent weed killer and fertilizer to all beds and continued the mulching of beds with leaves.

The approximate 1200 foot extension of the water line from the newly installed water meter to the river bottom bank is expected in the next few days.

The Jeremias' Rose Garden in Newberry, South Carolina, includes over 1000 plants and may be visited with advance reservation arrangement. Dr. Jeremias, a professor at Newberry College, has talked to Spartanburg gardeners a few years ago. Would you like to join a club visit to this garden in June?

Fairforest Park, Highland Ave. Area — The winter-spring work in this area has added about 150 trees (40 varieties) to the 100 or so periphery plantings of past years. The planting, back filling and mulching with leaves was completed by May 2. The emergence of leaves on these trees and a grass mowing by Parks and Recreation Dept. made a beautiful scene. We salute Harold Hatcher for leading this extensive work effort and the several members and many civil workers who helped.

Tree Bank Area — To the provision for drainage of this area there has been added an irrigation system. City Water Systems personnel provided a free water meter and ditched the 1200 foot line. City engineering personnel laid the 2" line with two terminal junction boxes about 100 feet apart in the tree bank area. Two headers with four connections each permit operation of eight sprinklers which water the total area. All materials and equipment were provided by the Club, and totaled less than budget. We salute Jess Taylor for handling this project.

The plant inventory of Fairforest Tree Bank totals about 7500 plants including close to 4000 crape myrtle cuttings. Again, Harold Hatcher, several members, and a number of civil workers, have participated. So far hoeing, mulching, weeding and fertilizing have kept ahead of the adverse growth. Members should visit this operation on a Saturday morning and participate in leading these operations when possible.

Further new club assets are plantings of about 200 yellow jacket crysanthemums for Fall use and 3000 planting photinia cuttings for the 1987-88 treelet distribution. Again work by civil workers with Harold.

Blue Ridge Region Fall Meeting: Dr. Gil Hooper, President of the Region this year, discussed plans for this meeting at Converse College, Saturday, October 3. An interesting meeting is being planned. The afternoon garden visits or tours are still open to any suggestions the membership may have.

National M.G.C. Meeting in Rockford, IL, June 13-16 is going to be asked to approve an increase in annual dues and their billing and collection of dues directly from members. Recommendations for alternate solutions to nationals' problems are being discussed among regional clubs by the writer, John Nevison.




