### Pine Street Red Maple Planting

This planting of approximately 200 red maples between East Main and I-85 suffered about 10% fatality during our summer months. About thirty new maples have replaced those lost and filled in on the Richard Kelley property, a new participant in this project. Vic Bailey's Ford property is one of the few non-participants in this project.

### **Childrens Shelter Landscaped**

Fifteen trees from the Club tree bank and eight from member nurseries were planted December 23, 1987 using a truck and a load of leaf mold from the Fairforest leaf bank. Henry Pittmer led this project with help from Roy King, Jess Taylor, John Nevison and two public service clients. This board fence enclosed play yard has been developed with help from several other parties. Chapman Grading helped prepare site by breaking up old paving in the area.; Glen Easler supplied two truck loads of top soil; and University Landscape and Garden graded and seeded the area.

#### 1987-88 Tree Distribution

The Harold Hatcher led tree distribution has had another successful run. 103 trees were donated for Arbor Day plantings or for public institution plantings. These went to 24 different sites. The telephone pioneers arranged for 41 of these trees to be planted at 13 different schools.

Our treasurer, Jess Taylor, summed up the trees sold at about 1700, bringing in about \$5,000.00. The January 7 snow storm blotted out several order pick-ups scheduled for Saturday, January 9. The leading varieties were Crape Myrtles, all colors, about 515; Bradford Pears, about 280; Maples, red and sugar, 230; Dogwood, white and pink, 214.

#### **Tree Banks**


Two tree bank tasks completed before the storm were (1) mulching all bagged trees at 820 Reidville Road with leaves to shield from the cold and (2) at Fairforest, consolidating the approximate 200 treelets left in areas largely dug and sold so the ground can be prepared for new plantings. The several members and civil service clients who have performed this work are greatly appreciated.

Jobs pending suitable weather are: (1) preparing the soil at Fairforest tree bank for about 300 new treelet plantings (this is to be done by Parks and Rec. personnel); (2) planting new treelets coming in from State and commercial nurseries.

Then there are a considerable number of tree bank plants to go into the new plantings in Route 29. Blackstock Road to Interstate 26.

### Looking Ahead in 1988

Club officers are reviewing 1987 activities for guidance in developing plans for 1988. Storm delays will move reporting of such plans in our next bulletin.

Also in January, our Asheville gardening friend Wesley Saams underwent coronary repair surgery. He is at home and progressing well.

**TREE BANKS:** Ground is being prepared by Parks and Recreation personnel, as weather permits, for the small treelet plantings, about 3000, scheduled for the next several weeks.

The dormant season distribution, largely completed by last month, has now continued past the 2000 treelet mark.

Replacement plantings have been made for the few trees lost last summer on the W.O. Ezell Blvd. islands. Preparations are made for additional plantings at Fair-forest Park, upper level. Harold Hatcher, club member helpers and civil helpers have been, and are, doing this work.

**ROUTE 29, BLACKSTOCK ROAD TO I-26** Landscaping this highway has moved to the front burner. Tourism and matching club funds are committed to this project. State Highway Department personnel have approved the planting of about 150 crape myrtle in the median and 50 dogwood trees, white and pink, in the intersection triangle. This work is targeted for this month.

CITY WATER STORAGE TANKS, Kennedy and Liberty Streets Mr. Billy Turner, head of our City Water System, has requested club help with landscaping plans for this central city facility. The two large elevated tanks are already painted as a sylvan landscape, acknowledging Spartanburg's "Tree City, USA" rating. Club directors are developing suggestions for landscaping the property, About 450 ft. of 8 ft. chain link fence face the Kennedy and Liberty Street sides of this property. There is six feet of soil between fence and streets. Thus a screen of low growing trees, say Austrian Pine, coud be grown inside the fence and flowering trees and shrubs (dogwood and crape myrtle) planted outside the fence. It is a prime central city spot for a good display.

**FURTHER LANDSCAPING OPPORTUNITIES:** In addition to the above, your directors have requests to consider landscaping improvement recommendations at Duncan Park Baseball Field. A further project, holding on the back burner, is to develop a plan for E. Main Street landscaping improvements similar to the recent Pine St. project.

In short, be alert to vacant or neglected lots in our town that could be beautified with a little help and encouragement from our Garden Club. Give you club officers a note on these possibilities.

Our President, Walter Soderberg, has been asked to have two of our members sit on a *Blue Banner Committee*, made up of representatives from community civil groups, to deal with Historic Site maintenance and care. Our Bill Ott and Perrin Hayes so volunteered. The committee chairman is John Wardlaw.

CERTIFICATE OF APPRECIATION to the Spartanburg Men's Garden Club has been passed to our President, Walter Soderberg. This is from Walter M. Stokes, probation officer, in charge of assigning public service persons to do civil work in our community. We all commend our Harold Hatcher for leading our club's participation in this program.

Fairforest Tree Banks City Streets and Parks and Recreation personnel completed a fine job of planting bed preparation and planting of new treelets has moved rapidly this past month. Close to 6000 one year treelets have been planted adding to the large carry over of crape myrtles. Of the new plantings, about 700 are photinia from the 820 Reidville Road nursery and about 4500 are white dogwood from the Salem, S.C. state nursery.

The distribution of trees has continued at a much lesser pace since our January bulletin report. The total for '87 - '88 is at 2400; leading items are crape myrtles 553, flowering pears 361, dogwoods 495, and maples 251. We thank Jess Taylor for the tabulations.



**Litter Pick-Up Week, April 10-16** Our club members helped get this week off to a good start by turning out Saturday, April 9th. Dave Kennemur got the word out and arranged with Leah Cheek of the County Beautification Commission for litter bags. Route 29, Blackstock Road to I-26 This project, supported by tourism funds and our treasury, has been completed this past weekend. About 100 crape myrtles of five different colors have been planted in the Route 29 median. At the triangle connecting with I-29 about 50 trees have been planted: 10 red and 20 white dogwoods about the periphery and twenty more of 10 different varieties in the center. The dogwoods are small but in bloom now! Unless our weather brings rain, there will be some watering done on these trees next week. We commend Harold Hatcher and the members who have carried out this project.

**Bagging Building for "Hatcher Park"** Your directors are proposing a building, security enclosure and open shed be erected at 820 Reidville Road, the property given to the city by the Hatcher family. This to facilitate continuation of our dormant season treelet distribution in Spartanburg Country. To facilitate consideration of this proposal, Jess Taylor has prepared drawings and a materials list for such a structure. Materials alone are estimated to total \$2500 to \$3000.00. Construction could largely be handled by members and volunteers. It is felt that this project is a most worthy one for support by our treasury which has been a beneficiary of this project over the years. Our membership will be kept advised as to developments on this proposal.

Jim Painter is a native of this area whose family are well known peach growers. He went to Clemson to gain Bachelor and Master degrees in Horticulture, '69 and '71. He came to Spartanburg Tech to teach in '71, and heads the Horticulture Department there. In this position he has the responsibility for maintenance of the garden donated by the Hatcher families to the Spartanburg Foundation in December '86. Jim and a brother have a venture business, Painter's Landscaping.

We urge good attendance to learn of the forward plans Jim and his associates are developing for this garden. A brochure on this subject will be on hand. Further, as stated in our April 13, '88 bulletin, your Club Directors have voted to contribute up to \$3500 toward construction of a pole barn type structure to house joint activities: classes by Spartanburg Tech and Plant Bagging for treelet distribution by the club. President Walter Soderberg and club officers would like the membership's approval of this expenditure at this meeting. The committee appointed to work with Spartanburg Tech on this project are Harold Hatcher, Frank Cunningham, Jess Taylor, Tom Bartram and John Nevison, chairman.




