

**Utility Shed at Hatcher Gardens** —To provide adequate equipment and materials storage at Hatcher Gardens, your directors decided we would underwrite the installation of a 12' x 30' utility shed. The pole type structure is contracted with Hoover Builders of Greer, the same people who built the basic part of the present shop/meeting pavillion. With building the canopy of the structure as soon as possible, we will be ready in a few days to invite member carpenters, men and women, to help nail on the siding, fabricate and hang sliding doors.

Garden Benches of Jess Taylor design and fabrication have been built for Hatcher Gardens. Six of these have been provided by our club to enhance the pleasure of a Springtime visit to the gardens. These are of treated lumber to protect against decay. Because the lumber has been thoroughly wet, the benches need to dry out before they can be painted. To do this will require some member therapy during warm weather. Jess has included several friends and members in supply of these sturdy and durable benches.

Landscaping at the Total Ministries Office, 1000 S. Pine has been concluded. The approx. 10' x 20' "yard" area is surrounded by 35 border plants and has a 4' x 6' flower bed in the center. The border plants and open area is heavily mulched with wood chips.

**Beaumont Mill Project** — The club received funding from anonymous sources to upgrade the Pine Street landscape appearance of this old mill. A committee of Henry Pittman, Tom Bartram, Darwin Helvy and Gil Hooper has planned a "New Look" and is currently subcontracting







Do you have moles? Publicity specialist Dave Kennemur's avocation, cat-

ching moles in '90 and '91, has had this experience:

Dave dug a little chamber about 5" x 7" at the intersection of two mole "runs" in his backyard. A mouse trap was set, baited with a dry kernel of corn, and covered by an inverted pail weighted down with a brick. Occasional inspection would reveal the catch and the trap would be reset. In 1990 the catch counted 58, so far in '91 the catch has increased another 20. Dave reports these are a strain called Virginia Moles (note, not Clemson moles). He insists they are all local, none from the orient.

Walter Soderburg has been beset by moles in the past and recommends planting castor beans (mole corn). This results in the moles leaving.

Presumably a toxicity reaction.




