1993 Planning — Your officers and directors have held a couple of planning sessions since our last meeting, and we believe 1993 will be a banner year for the club.

Tree Bank Sales — It looks like the 1992-93 sales will again be sizeable, generating funds for some worthwhile projects. Harold Hatcher and his group of regulars including John Nevison, Walter Soderberg, Jess Taylor, Harold Browning, Ben DeLuca and Winston Hardegree were given occasional assistance by others in digging, bagging, and operating the Saturday sales at Hatcher Gardens. The program is just about wound down for this dormant season.

Tree Bank Plans — Your officers and Harold are talking to the City about a plan wherein the City will take over a portion of the tree bank and operate it to grow trees for their own use. With such a plan in place it is believed that the Bank can be operated without as much pressure on Harold Hatcher.

Also, the Club is discussing a joint venture with the Board of Realtors in which we would continue to grow dogwoods and small crape myrtle for sale by the Realtors. It looks at this point like a worthwhile arrangement for both parties and a step forward in getting more trees into the community.

Winter Pruning — Late winter is the best time for most pruning — after the worst weather is past and before the new sap flow. Most shrubs and vines can be pruned, except those spring flowering shrubs (e.g. azaleas) that are pruned after blooming. A fine inexpensive guide to the mysteries of pruning with excellent pictures and diagrams is Ortho's "All About Pruning". It's available at Mark's Garden World, Walmart, and Home Depot, and likely several other spots.

Container Plant Farms — Jess Taylor chairs a committee (John Nevison, Ben DeLuca, and Winston Hardegree) developing a plan wherein individuals will provide home care for container shrubs which will be eventually sold by the club at Hatcher Gardens. Sounds like an interesting way to perpetuate our reputation as a tree bank sort of organization.

Tree Sales — As previously reported, this past season's sale was quite good. Final plans have been made to prepare some 2,000 dogwoods for the Real Estate Board sale in March. Chicken Breath — Last Sunday's New York Times told of a lady gardener in Massachusetts who conducts a \$100,000. gross per year greenhouse producing lettuce, arugula, parsley, etc. using only solar panels and the heat generated from a flock of chickens in the greenhouse. She calculates chickens as producing 8 BTUs per lb. per hour, and carefully recirculates the carbon dioxide and ammonia produced by the chickens. She considered using rabbits as a heat source, but decided they like lettuce too much. (really)

Spring Tour & Picnic:

SATURDAY, April 17, 1993 • 1:30 p.m. Hatcher Gardens, Reidville Road

Instead of our regular Monday meeting, we'll meet the preceding Saturday for a picnic and a guided tour of Hatcher Gardens in the Spring. This early issue of our Bulletin urges you to attend and bring guests.

Members and guests should bring a bag lunch and meet at 1:00 p.m. The Club will supply eating utensils and drinks only. After lunch there will be conducted tours along 1-1/2 miles of trails. The tour should take about two hours.

Container Gardening Project — At our last meeting, just following the snowstorm, we were without a speaker, but Winston Hardegree ably filled in with a rundown on the plans for our new major project. Dick Look enthusiastically related his experiences propagating a number of plants by the recommended procedures. All present seemed to enjoy the presentation of the new program, and, by show of hands, indicated that we will have sufficient participation to make the project financially worthwhile for the Club.

Since that meeting, our Chairmen, Taylor and Hardegree, have been busy and are ready to start the program. At this stage we need about 15 participants who will be supplied with the materials and methods by members of the committee to start about 100 plants each with the object of having plants for sale in Spring, 1994. Additional growers will be accommodated later. Growers will need to commit an area about 15' x 15' in a partially-shaded area (some afternoon shade preferred) with a water supply nearby. Growers should be ready with materials in place by early June in order to start with soft wood cuttings of their choice (azaleas, rhodedendron, holly, forsythia, butterfly bush, weigelia, hydrangea – or whatever). To volunteer, make an appointment with either Winston Hardegree (576-2347), or Jess Taylor (579-3880). They will supply the materials and help with any information needed. The materials include a cold frame, rooting and growing medium, fungicide, and containers.

Some small trees ("liners") in larger pots will be made available for growers. The present supply is about 200 Levland cypress. More trees later.

Charles is from Inman, was formerly with Inman Feed and Seed, and is an active Master Gardener. He reorganized the herb garden at Walnut Grove Plantation, and has appeared frequently on Charley Gray's "Clemson Today" TV program.

Landscape Judging — Our Club has a continuing commitment with the Spartanburg Chamber of Commerce to serve annually as judge in determining those area businesses to be honored for superior landscape design and maintenance. The Chamber publicizes the event to its members, and normally over 100 area business, industry and public institutions ask to participate. Winners in several categories are honored at a reception held by the Chamber.

This year's judging will take place Saturday morning June 5th. We need some 20 plus members to serve as judges in teams of two. If you are new to the activity, you will be assigned with an experienced judge. Try it, sign up at the meeting or call Bob Almond (579-3288) — you'll enjoy it. We meet at the Chamber offices, 8:00 AM for coffee, Danish, and instructions, and complete the exercise by noon.




