Sustainable Farming at Cleveland Preserve Farm

Sallie Hembright-Belue and Brent Belue are the co-owners of Thicketty Mountain Farms. Located in Cowpens, it is a small, diverse family farm, where the Belues currently raise grass-fed beef and sustainablygrown vegetables.

They got started in 2011 when the two became concerned about the health and safety of the food they were eating. Brent left his job in the local music industry to begin farming full time. Sallie farms part-time and is an architect and an assistant professor at Clemson University where her research focuses on the intersection between architecture and agriculture.

This past year Sallie and Brent expanded their operations to include the Cleveland Preserve, which is a 300 acre farm owned by the Spartanburg Area Conservancy, or SPACE. The farm is transitioning to organic and it is anticipated that this certification will be attained in 2018.

Sallie will be presenting how she and Brent apply sustainable farming practices to deliver fresh, healthy whole foods, and what they are doing at Cleveland Preserve Farm to develop it using these methods.

If 2/3 majority approves the above:

- May & June SMGC newsletters publish list of potential names from surveys. Members may submit additional new names to newsletter editor by May 1st.
- June member meeting—
 members vote by paper ballot to
 select the new name and formally amend the By-Laws.

The Board of Directors has instructed the Focus Group Committee to bring a proposal to approve a Club name change to the membership for a formal vote.

The motion to present the proposal was approved by a vote of 8 ayes, 2 nays & 1 abstention at February's board meeting. Two board members were absent.

The Focus Group Committee worked throughout 2016 to survey members and the public for data about the Club's brand perception and awareness of women members.

Member Results: 75% of club members said they would consider a name change.

Public Results: 34 public surveys at four local events this past Fall indicate that the Club has an identity crisis among prospective members today, despite its long and respected history.

- 55% were unaware the club has women members
- 39% said a name change would be appropriate (33% said no, 27% unsure)
- 25% said the current name would keep them from joining
- 61% said a name change would not encourage them to join

During the research, a lot of ideas came up about how to ensure the Club's future by staying relevant to the membership and to the Spartanburg community. The Board will be working to explore these further.





Jon Storm is an Associate Professor of Biology at the University of South Carolina Upstate. He teaches Introductory Biology, Ecology & **Evolution**, and Comparative Vertebrate Anatomy. His research focuses on small mammal ecology and animal behavior, and he is the author of the interactive, digitally-based Field Guide to the Southern Piedmont. 

The Board of Directors has instructed the Focus Group Committee to bring a proposal to approve a Club name change to the membership for a formal vote.

The motion to present the proposal was approved by a vote of 8 ayes, 2 nays & 1 abstention at February's board meeting. Two board members were absent.

The Focus Group Committee worked throughout 2016 to survey members and the public for data about the Club's brand perception and awareness of women members.

Member Results: 75% of club members said they would consider a name change.

Public Results: 34 public surveys at four local events this past Fall indicate that the Club has an identity crisis among prospective members today, despite its long and respected history.

- 55% were unaware the club has women members
- 39% said a name change would be appropriate (33% said no, 27% unsure)
- 25% said the current name would keep them from joining
- 61% said a name change would not encourage them to join

During the research, a lot of ideas came up about how to ensure the Club's future by staying relevant to the membership and to the Spartanburg community. The Board will be working to explore these further.

Dr. Jack Turner, founder of the Upstate Watershed Ecology Center, will be demonstrating how easy it is to assemble and install a rain barrel to capture roof runoff for use on your land. 

I joined the Spartanburg Men's Garden Club in 1997 with Bob Almond's encouragement, after buying crepe myrtles wrapped in sheet plastic at the March '97 SMGC/Board of Realtors plant sale held in The Beacon's parking lot. Over the years I have enjoyed the wide variety of meeting speakers, knocked on Drayton Avenue doors to get approval for street tree plantings, participated in potting sessions, litter pickup, plant sales and landscape judging, coauthored the crepe myrtle brochure with Henry Pittman, facilitated the publication of the Club history, and served on the board three times for a total of 10 years, including four years as Secretary and the last two and a half years as Newsletter Editor.

I have a tremendous respect for our members and for the Club's long history of important civic contributions, plus I learn something new every time we get together. Therefore, it is with deep regret that I am tendering my resignation from the board and general membership, effective as of the end of June.

The motion at the May member meeting to change the name to Spartanburg Community Garden Club was lost by two votes, an extremely disappointing outcome. There are no plans to revisit the subject any time soon. Taken together, these two things send a clear message that women, who make up 46% of the membership, will never be accorded the recognition, credit and respect they have earned since they began joining and contributing as active Club members 20+ years ago. That includes me, and I'm not going to continue to settle; we have proven our value to the Club but it has been dismissed where it counts – in the public-facing persona of the club.

It is time for me to move on, rather than continue contributing to an organization that doesn't take action when presented with compelling data that its current name is a threat to its survival - specifically, that the name "Spartanburg Men's Garden Club" is negatively affecting brand identity and new member recruitment.

I appreciate everything that you have done as President, wish you and the other members all the best, and encourage you and the rest of the Board members to continue leading the charge to help the Club find its way to a sustainable, successful future.

Princess Tree (or Princesstree) is an aggressive ornamental that grows rapidly in disturbed earth. It can survive wildfires, tolerates pollution and many different soil types and regenerates quickly from its roots. It is very recognizable—young sapling leaves are 12" across, twice the size of mature tree leaves, and the Trees Coalition nickname for it is "Shady Lady." Clemson Extension and the Southeast Exotic Pest Plant Council both classify it as a severe threat.

Trees Coalition President Newt Hardie advises, "We need to be able to identify this wayward woman and thwart her at every occurrence." He advocates removing the trees by cutting them down and painting the stumps with stump killer within five minutes of making the cut. Burn or landfill seed pods.







Forestry is the science, art, and practice of managing forest substainably. This talk will be about the role that foresters play in the management of forest ecosystems. The historic 2016 wildfire season and what contributed to it will be discussed

Hagan Bio:

Don Hagan is an Assistant Professor in the Department of Forestry and Environmental Conservation at Clemson University, where he teaches courses in Forest Ecology, Fire Ecology, Forest Communities and Dendrology, among others. He received his BS in Environmental Studies from the University of West Florida and his MS and PhD in Forest Ecology from the University of Florida. He conducts most of his research in the southern Appalachian and Piedmont regions, but he has also worked extensively in the SE Coastal Plain, Florida, and in the tropical dry forests of coastal Ecuador. Current research projects primarily focus on fire, and are supported by the Department of the Interior, the US Forest Service and the National Park Service. His research has been published in journals such as the Journal of Forestry, the International Journal of Wildland Fire, Fire Ecology, Invasive Plant Science and Management, and Plant Ecology. Hagan serves as faculty advisor for the Forestry Club and the student chapter of the Society of American Foresters, and works closely with the "Fire Tigers" — Clemson's student-run wildland and prescribed fire crew. Since 2015 he has served on the board of the Consortium of Appalachian Fire Managers and Scientists.
