NOTES ON PROPAGATING SHRUBS FROM HARD WOOD CUTTINGS

- 1. Take cuttings in late January or early February.
 - 6 to 8 inches long, about the size of a lead pencil
 - Angle cut on lower end and flat cut on upper end
 - Tie each bundle with rubber band and label
- 2. Bury this good stuff in a bucket of sand.
 - Use 5 gallon bucket with a hole in the bottom for drainage
 - Put bundles in bucket and cover tops of bundles with 2 inches of sand.
 - Wet contents thoroughly and cover bucket with lid or polyethelene secured with a rubber band.
- Store in a cool place and check every couple of weeks to be sure the sand is moist.
- 4. In mid March set the cuttings out in a semi-shady part of the garden, dip in Rootone and set 6 inches apart,
 12 inch row spaceing. The top bud should be at the soil surface.
- 5. Prune for shape and to encourage multiple shoots.
- 6. Pot up in late summer.
- 7. Burden your gardening friends with the surplus plants.
